COMMUNITY FOUNDATION DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

he fundamental pillars of philanthropy that relate to commitment, inclusion, transparency, empowerment, collaboration and celebration are at the heart of giving and empowering communities, and this falls in line with the objectives of SGS Consulting and the Zambia Governance Foundation (ZGF). The paradigm of local, community giving was at the forefront, when the Zambian community foundations with an interest in community

philanthropy gathered on September 20, at a workshop hosted by SGS.

The highly successful workshop was attended by a host of community foundations including Chemu Community Foundation. Community Foundation. Nyankanga Masebela Community Foundation, Chinzete Community Foundation, Kaminembe Community Foundation and Chilimba Community Foundation.

The workshop discussions highlighted several socio-economic challenges that are being faced at community level in Zambia, how to overcome them through local giving and the unlocking of local assets. In this respect, to re-entrench the art of giving back into the lives of people.

The workshop session also elevated the Asset-Based Community-led Development (ABCD) approach to philanthropy through the identification of local financial and non-financial assets in the communities, highlighting several challenges where community resolve and locally-led development initiatives are accentuated



HOW THE NEED FOR A SCHOOL BROUGHT A COMMUNITY TOGETHER

The philanthropy vision of community foundations, Kalutvhilla, Moogolo, Chikanyang, Kalasa and parts of Mwema, took a step closer to becoming a reality when the ZGF's Community Development Unit that supports community foundations, conducted a field trip to the Masebela area on September 21 2023. The proposed school has become critical, given the walking distance from home to school of between eight to ten kilometres in one direction. The distance learners are required to walk each day also presents dangers, with a learner having lost her life on the way to school in 2010. As a result many learners have dropped out of the schooling system. Many are engaged in early child marriages.

The trip happened the day after the community philanthropy workshop, allowing for lessons from the workshop session to be put into practice."

The community decided to unite to address these challenges. Parents, chiefs, headmen and head women, put plans together to build a primary school. Working in hand with the Masebela Community Foundation, a successful fundraising effort led to the start of the building phase, where the building has reached roof height. Funding now needs to be mobilised to complete the roofing, bathrooms, water supplies and water boreholes. Water supply itself is a critical need in the community as learners need to travel three kilometres to access clean water. Exacerbating access to clean water is the problem with livestock drinking from the nearest water point, resulting in the contamination of the water.

The need for qualified, committed teachers is now a major requirement, as the school not only intends to cater for school-age learners, but also to offer basic learning courses for adults, who are furthering their education. Currently, ZGF is assisting the community foundation in its registration with the Patents and Companies Registration Agency (PACRA), the costs of which have been fundraised by the community. In addition, the community has set its sights on building a clinic, as the nearest medical facility is 12 kilometres away.

Throughout the two days, a core element of discussion was the challenges and opportunities within ZGF's philanthropic endeavours.

Following the successful week, ZGF Programmes Assistant - Communication and Advocacy, Chanda Mutuna said: "SGS Consulting shared a lot of significant information on how we can improve our organisation's

different ways of doing things." M&E Specialist Aseli Kunda remarked, "The biggest highlight for me was how we are supposed to change the way we work." Fatima Mawele, Communications and Advocacy Specialist felt the session "was a great way for me to understand how best I can integrate my communications goals with those of ZGF's to make the most out of our operations." IT Specialist Hussein Lunat added, "The sessions made me understand how to put myself in the Communityled Development team's shoes for me to better provide them with ICT support." Meanwhile, ICT Intern Bwalya Nonde remarked, "One thing I learned is that instead of being too quick to point fingers when things go wrong in the workplace, it is better to reflect first from my end to see what I'm not doing right, and what I can do to better support the team."

side from the community philanthropy work, SGS introduced the Ford Foundation Social Justice Resource initiative to nine Community Based Organisations (CBO's) that work in the social justice space in Zambia.

The CBO's focus on advocacy, scaling up human rights, health, climate justice, sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR), gender based violence (GBV), and education skills development for youth, early child marriages and disability rights. The resource hub provides institutional support and capacity building to grassroots organisations and explored possibilities of how these grassroots organisations could be assisted.

The CBO's welcomed the initiative and indicated that it couldn't have come at a better time. A common need for support was around resource mobilisation. Yolisa Lawrence, the Programmes Coordinator for Community Philanthropy also took the opportunity to introduce the concept of community philanthropy to these CBO's. Yolisa extended an invitation to the

to advance their social justice work. Combining community philanthropy with social justice challenged us to move towards a better understanding of the concept of social justice philanthropy, which is giving that focuses on addressing the root causes of social injustice.

An afternoon information session was held with consultants who were invited to learn about the Resource Hub. This provided an opportunity to assess their levels of interest in working with the Resource Hub, where they would be matched to the specific requests of the CBO's. Consultants emphasised that CBO's need to identify their "why" to increase their relevance, identify their resource gaps, and develop meaningful partnerships with a common agenda in order to create visibility for themselves and attract funding.
